Engaging youth in service

The waiting list continues to grow for the popular Seniors in Cyberspace program and "Annual "A Very Halal Christmas Dinner" for seniors and legion veterans at **Monarch Park Collegiate**. Students and staff work collaboratively to welcome 250 seniors into their school.

This year Monarch Park Collegiate formed a new partnership with **Citizens' Environment Watch (CEW)** where meaningful partnerships were formed with youth and seniors. The seniors empowered the youth by giving them a historical and cultural context of their local environment through the life experiences of seniors. Funding through the **New Horizons for Seniors Program** enabled CEW to publish stories written by youth and a project video documenting the intergenerational events and excerpts of seniors' interviews was also created to be included with the storybook.

Wisdom begins in wonder

The **Wartime Biography Project** at Kensingston Gardens has been a real life history lesson.

Seniors residing at **Kensington Gardens** reminisced about their past and shared wartime stories with youth from **Heydon Park Secondary School.**

Students Julia, Krystal, Jessie, Sabrina, Chantal and Stephanie wrote, "We would like to thank the seniors for spending time with us. If it weren't for them, we wouldn't be living in a free country. We were shocked when we realized that the soldiers were our age when they fought for us. We liked how the seniors told us stories about the war. Many died or made other sacrifices for our freedom. The seniors showed us how to be brave. We were proud to bring the war stories back to school to share with other students at our Remembrance Day Ceremony. Our friends at school really listened; they felt and they learned. We all understand so much better and enjoyed getting to know about the interesting lives of our seniors."



"Our residents come from various backgrounds and cultures. This is a great opportunity for our residents to share their life experiences and knowledge with the students. At the same time, this promotes healthy attitudes towards aging among the students" Amy Seto, Volunteer Coordinator at Kensington Gardens.

Judy Grant, teacher at Heydon Park Secondary School agreed that "The Kensington Gardens residents were so generous with their time and energy. We truly appreciated the honesty, sincerity and hospitality that the residents showed us. We were touched by the candidly presented real life stories that the students were able to bring back to their fellow teens. Many of our students rarely, if ever, have contact with anyone beyond their parents' generation. Our lives have been enriched. We hope to return sometime soon."

Sharing life experiences

The Glenyan Manor Grandpal Program is a two-year initiative in the Flemingdon community, funded through a grant from the Social Investment Fund of Toronto Community Housing Corporation.

Children, youth, adults and seniors residing in **CHU20** will be working together to reminisce about their lives and share their experiences with each other.

The program will provide an opportunity for participants to share their cultural traditions while learning about others. Plans are underway to hold a "CultureFest" and community event.

Roy was a familiar face in the Moore Place and Eglinton Public School Grandpal Program. He volunteered to assist the teacher, escort the children to the program and led curriculum-related activities with small groups of elementary school-children.

students. When the program ended, Roy was quick to take a lead role in developing the **Chester Village**Horitcultural Program where he researches the plant of the week and teaches seniors with dementia about plants and gardening.

Community networking amongst peers

A grant from New Horizons for Seniors Program provided an opportunity for over 200 seniors to participate in the monthly Intergenerational Volunteer Advisory Committee's (IVAC)

monthly networking sessions throughout the past year. These sessions provided an opportunity for seniors to learn how to access health services and supports while strengthening intergenerational and peer relations. Guest speakers shared relevant information on accessing home care supports, home and community safety,

oral health, dental services for seniors, advocacy for the elderly, fire prevention, fall prevention and community volunteerism.

As a result of this initiative we have formed new programs, including an Intergenerational Environmental Watch Project, Intergenerational Choir and redeveloped the Intergenerational Lunch Program at Greenwood Towers. Our volunteer base increased as seniors became involved in their community in the Reading Partner and Horticultural programs.

With over 65 youth and 65 seniors involved in the Seniors in Cyberspace program during the past two years, **Working Women Community Centre** staff feel that this is one of the most popular computer programs that they offer.

The waiting lists are long, however, seniors don't mind waiting as they feel the program provides a feeling of independence while learning new skills. The youth volunteers gain an understanding about aging and feel a sense of fulfillment as they teach seniors about information technology.

WWCC expanded their programming this year to include a Mandarin-speaking Seniors in Cyberspace program.
