Youth Engaged in Community Service

DCTI Youth in Action

The newly formed Danforth Collegiate Intergenerational Club evolved as a result of ten youth volunteering with seniors at Greenwood Towers during the past 3 years.





Whether raising funds through Hot Chocolate Sales, assisting TIGP at special events and fundraisers or spending quiet times with their senior partners at Greenwood Towers, the club members can always be counted on to help in and around their school community. What a great group of youth volunteers! Appreciation is extended to Danforth Collegiate and Technical Institute for providing TIGP with funding through a Ministry of Education, Urban Priority High School grant. This funding enables TIGP to provide a lunch and transportation program for youth who become engaged in their communities.

Creating Intergenerational Spirit at Riverdale Collegiate

"The Riverdale Intergenerational Club was revived after 10 years of silence thanks to teacher Mary Card and a group of keen students. Having a sincere interest in being involved with older generations, I worked with my friend Ling Ta to form a new club at our school. The club had slow beginnings, however by the end of the first year accelerated towards its mission: to enhance the lives of the senior citizens in our community. With the much appreciated help of TIGP, which we proudly work alongside with, we volunteered at various TIGP events to raise funds, such as the Festive Bazaar and Temptations. Our club made and distributed over 60 Christmas and Easter Cards for seniors, introduced Riverdale's first Button Drive, which successfully raised over \$400, all in support of the seniors of our community. As well, we provided opportunities for students to earn volunteer hours, such as interacting with seniors at East York Acres. History repeats itself as most of the members are graduates, and the reason for the first Intergenerational club fading out was due to members graduating. The Golden Girls at Notre Dame

Nea Okada and Emily Marzari wanted to bridge the gap between their school (Notre Dame) and seniors residing at Main Street Terrace. Inspired by a television program, Nea and Emily consulted with Notre Dame teachers and Main Street Terrace staff to develop a program to enable students to develop intergenerational friendships through volunteer service. Lori Chizewski, Program Manager at Main Street Terrace shared that "the seniors are delighted when the girls visit and many special memories have been created." In addition to weekly social visiting with their senior partners, the Golden Girls have also helped with the annual Christmas wrapping and have assisted at two Main Street Terrace special events.
