IN MEMORY OF SEVEN OAKS

In September and October 2005, as many as 135 people at Seven Oaks, including residents, visitors, staff and even neighbours were reportedly affected by Legionnaires' Disease which is caused by the inhalation of contaminated water particles. At Seven Oaks, it was traced to the air conditioning system. A class action lawsuit was filed to compensate for illness and loss of life. After the settlement proceeds were distributed to these individuals some funds remained. These remaining funds are being distributed to two organizations that serve seniors.

Although saddened by the situation, TIGP is thankful for being selected as a recipient of the settlement funds as we will be able to increase our capacity to enrich the lives of marginalized seniors throughout the City of Toronto, in memory of Seven Oaks.




